WB Mac, then went on to explain the organization of York Rite and how it supports the Blue Lodge, what the degrees are in each of the Chapters and the charities they support. His talk was very informative and well received.

It should be encouraged among the newer members, not only to prepare them for future Officer Positions but to help create a sense of purpose and a real feeling that they are needed by the Lodge. It could help them begin the fulfilling journey into ritual work that so many of us enjoy.

This program may also help with retention of members especially when the participating brethren are used to give lectures, to fill in when presiding officers are absent or to help with the coaching of newer members. By generating a positive atmosphere among the newer members, this could possibility increase their desire to become more active and to attract prospective members.

The continued success and growth of our Lodge is determined in large part by the skill with which its affairs and Ritual Proficiency Program are managed by those elected to leadership roles. Our Lodge will continue to grow and the more activities we have going, the more people we need to run them. We would love to have you!

In Honor of WB James F. Riggins

This last year, Arizona Masonry has lost some very fine, dedicated brothers, one of which was our own WB James F. Riggins.

Worshipful Brother James Frederick "Bucky" Riggins passed to the Celestial Lodge on December 27, 2015. Bucky served Scottsdale Lodge No. 43 as its forty fifth Master. While that in itself is significant, it is, as the legendary Paul Harvey used to say "the rest of the story" that got Bucky to that point.

WB Bucky was the son of WB L. F. (better known as Riggie) and Ullery Riggins in a long time Masonic family. Bucky's dad was a past master of Montezuma Lodge No. 35 in Phoenix in 1935, and if memory serves me correctly, was employed at the old Thunderbird Academy in north Scottsdale. Bucky spent a lot of time working at the academy helping his father. Over the years the academy no longer exists, but as a kid I remember the academy and remember when Scottsdale Rd. ended at that point as a paved road. Riggie went on to become an agriculture and trades instructor at Arizona State College, which is now Arizona State University. Bucky and I were at the ground breaking of our current temple in 1953, although we didn't know each other at that time.

I first met Bucky when we both attended Scottsdale High School. Bucky had been elected master councilor of the Scottsdale Chapter, Order of DeMolay, which was sponsored by our lodge. He appointed me to my first Masonic office of 6th Preceptor, and I eventually was elected to serve s Master Councilor of Scottsdale Chapter., Bucky and I would see each other on a daily basis at school.

In that period of time, Bucky petitioned Scottsdale Lodge for membership and was elected. He then became a dad advisor to the DeMolay chapter, and it was very odd. In DeMolay, everyone is referred to as brothers as we are in the lodge, but in DeMolay the Masons were always referred to as Dad. It created an odd situation as one day Bucky was brother and the next day he was dad. The DeMolays didn't know whether to call him Bucky or dad, so they didn't speak to him at all. That situation was eventually resolved.

Bucky became engaged to and married Caroline Nichols who was a Past Honored Queen on Jobs Daughters Bethel #7. They had two children, Elizabeth, who resides in Illinois, and Steven, who resides in Iowan and runs the family farm. They are the proud grandparents of 14 grandchildren. Bucky was an elementary teacher for thirty five years, and Caroline taught piano, which continues to this day.

Bucky and I lost contact with each other as is so often the case when you go to college and begin your careers but our paths again crossed when I became a member of the Scottish Rite bodies in Phoenix. In September, 1989, Bucky and I walked into lodge on the same night and truthfully, neither of us had been involved in lodge. Almost immediately, Bucky was appointed Senior Steward by incoming Master Robert Elsner, and thus began his journey to become Master. Six months later I was appointed Senior Deacon as WB Jesse Lee, who was the Junior Warden, had been transferred to Germany. Thus, my journey to become Master began. Bucky and I worked together in the Lodge and Scottish until his retirement from teaching, when he decided to attend seminary and become a pastor. I will never forget him saying to me, "In my family, you're either a teacher or preacher. I've been the teacher, now it's time to become the preacher".

Bucky served as youth pastor at the First Congregational Church in Tempe, as interim pastor in several churches around the valley until he received his calling at the West Valley Congregational Church in west Phoenix.

Bucky's Masonic resume includes, Master Councilor, Scottsdale Chapter, Order of DeMolay, Northern district Master for the State of Arizona, Worshipful Master, Scottsdale Lodge, 1995, Venerable Master, Phoenix Scottish Rite Bodies, Director of the Work for the Scottish Rite, as well as a cast member on several degrees. He was invested with the Knight Commander, Court of Honour, and coroneted with the 33rd Degree, Inspector General Honorary in 2005.

Memorial services for WB Riggins will be held on Saturday, April 9, 2016 at the West Valley Congregational Church, 4650 W. Thomas Rd. in Phoenix at 10:00 am.

Bucky, was a good man, husband, father, Mason, and friend. I'm honored to have called him my friend and my brother in DeMolay, and in Masonry, May he rest in piece.

I personally accept some responsibility for the visitor's experience because I heard a brother talking about the chair leg, but I assumed he would take it out of service. It was a liability to the Lodge. Lesson: Don tassume ANYTHING!

Another way you can be involved it if you see something that's "not right" DO SOMETHING BOUT IT! Fix it yourself if you know how or report it to Bro. Stan or the Secretary. Accountability is thereby created. You have done your job as a responsible and caring Mason and Lodge brother. We all want a safe environment and we all possess vast skills that allow each of us to view the Lodge with "different eyes." Thank each of you for "Stepping UP" in the future.

Brother Stan Sparrow is organizing an elite group of brothers for the "Brothers Building Brothers" team. These brothers will meet the first Monday after the Stated Meeting at 4:30PM at the Lodge to work on various Lodge projects. A form and box are in the process of being created for your use. Some of the suggested items will be projects for the "BBB team."

From the Marshal


Brethren,

Additionally, we had to located two Master Masons, which may have been a daunting task, that we had known for a minimum of six months, both of whom would be willing to be our top and bottom line signers. All the participants in our petitions had to sign off on our character. Character *is* the heart of Masonry.

It is the task of a committee, whom investigates prospective future members of our Lodge, to ascertain whether the prospective initiate will be a benefit to Masonry and conversely, be able to grow within the superstructure that has been erected by innumerable brothers whom went before us. Will he bring honor and virtue to our hollowed halls and is he a good man looking to become great? That is the task for the brothers to ascertain in the course of our investigation. 

As a member of the Finance Committee, I take my duty very seriously. The Finance Committee does not have a specific goal, nor an agenda. The purpose of the committee is to look out for the best interest of the lodge in regard to normal operations and future financial concerns (short and long term financial planning).

Some of the recent duties included an inventory of the lodge property for insurance documentation and value assessment. Thank you so much to you brothers who helped out.

Worshipful Bob Beffel prepared a complicated life expectancy and cost replacement for some of the expensive and critical assets of the lodge; the oven, air conditioner, roof and the parking lot. The lodge cash flows and our shrinking number of dues payers evaluated against the need for future expenditures directly influenced the recent dues increase.

This committee monitors the lodge expenses for irregularities and with cooperation from the treasurer seeks to reduce our annual regular costs (the goal is a 10% reduction). The new air conditioner and

the new lights are measures taken to reduce our utility costs.

This committee has a tacit interest in the fund raising activities of the lodge for purpose of cash flow projections. The most recent topic of interest is replenishing the Distressed Master Masons Widows and Orphans Fund with some big fund raisers. More to come on this topic.
