GREETINGS FROM THE EAST


The name of this month "May" is an interesting word in and of itself, so I asked for articles on how we use it in "May"-son-ry (sorry, I couldn't resist).

According Merriam-Webster, the word "May" is an archaic term for "Have the ability to". In more modern terms, it's use includes: have permission to, be free to, or to indicate possibility.



What has this to do with Masonry? I believe Masonry arms you with the tools and environment to become a better man. What you do with these tools "MAY" make you a better man. We often use the phrase, you get out of it (possibility from the definition) what you put into it. But it's also about permission to use these tools, once they have been explained to you in the environment that has been established for that purpose.

The term Mote shows up in one of the oldest Masonic documents, the Regius Poem from 1390. This poem ends with the couplet:



Amen! Amen! So mote it be! So say we all for charity!

When we say "So mote it be" at the end of a prayer, we are continuing a 600 year old tradition of how they ended prayers in 1390!

Perhaps it would behoove us to spend a little more time working to improve ourselves in the area of "will," and maybe a little less time speculating in the area of "may."

One certain tangible thing of which I speak is the traditional Lodge functions that bring together the members of our Masonic family year after year; Functions such as the Lodge picnic, Widows night, and the annual installation. These functions are tried and true, and so deeply ingrained in our Lodge culture that a big turn-out is guaranteed, whereas, newer function and ways of doing things tend to be risky endeavors, and are usually not as well received. Another tangible something is ritual. Ritual is what Masonry is. It is the heart and soul of Masonry and the basis and framework of every Lodge meeting. When something is so integral to Masonry, there is no question but that it is worth our time and effort to do it the best we can.

Over the last eight years, I have learned to trust the wisdom of Masonry. Reinventing the wheel is hard, though gradually, here and there, new concepts will take hold. New activities will become popular and eventually will become tradition. New ways of doing things will spread and eventually prevail. But nothing in Masonry happens overnight, and as any of our strongest traditions was once an idea about what is possible and what we *may* do, let us never forget what makes us Masons - our traditions, our culture, and our ritual - and let us never stop striving to perfect what the wisdom of Masonry mandates that we *will* do.




Tri-Centennial Medal, UGLOE


