The other matter involves a change in the By-Laws. The members present in the February Stated meeting voted unanimously to increase the dues by one percent annually rounded to the nearest dollar. This will increase the dues by \$2. To effect this By-Law change the membership must be notified via the trestleboard and email and then a formal vote of two-thirds supporting it will be necessary.

The raffle for the AR-15 went to Past Master Scott Tracy.

Keep a watchful eye for details in the Blasts on a lodge Spring League baseball game on 3/13/019.

Friday Fun night continues. March 15th we will have another beer and brats in the dining hall. Come out and bring a friend. We are playing games and growing our brotherhood.

Greetings from the East brethren. Coming up for a ballot is the motion to increase the dues by 1% annually rounded to the nearest dollar. This will raise the dues by \$200. We have no crisis that this \$2 increase is needed to solve. Several years ago WB Bob Beffel executed an asset replacement schedule that should protect the lodge from financial emergencies like a roof or the air conditioning. Four years ago it was an emergency to raise the dues by \$50 to meet our

expenses. This year our operating budget is intolerant of any unexpected expenses. Which means there is no room for error on expected costs and the expected revenues from dues and rentals. A small increase in the dues annually should keep us in the black for many years to come; 1% should be enough. I ran the numbers at 2% and it creates an un-necessary surplus. I ask you to support this so that a future Master will not need to raise the dues by \$50 again.

We raised three brothers last month. We read two more petitions. We elected and installed Jonathan D'Emilio to be Junior Warden and installed several junior officers to new chairs. And the Friend to Friend program is a wealth of talent desiring to join the craft.

I want to share with you an excerpt from an email that a brother shared with me. This brother is a well seasoned Mason. He wrote to the Master of the lodge in his home state after sitting in the Friend to Friend one night. "I know that I leaned much from attending this program (Friend to Friend) and it is one of the main reasons that this Lodge (Scottsdale) raises so many Brothers each year. I would also suggest that any Brother that was raised twenty plus years ago attend one of these sessions once to help them better understand today's society."

I am not suggesting that brothers sit in Friend to Friend and miss degree work, but I accept that a brother could learn something from the Friend to Friend program and I am grateful for the strength of Scottsdale's Friend to Friend. Thank you Ken VonHopf and Jim Watson.

I close with the admonition to reach out to a brother you have not spoken with in a while. It will raise your spirits and his too.

From the South


Brotherly Love


Many of our members work with our Masonic youth groups as advisors to assist with the leadership development of our young men and women. In addition, we raise funds for educational scholarships for college students.


BROTHERS TRANSPORTATION TO LODGE CALL IF YOU NEED A RIDE TO LODGE

What the Heck is a Landmark Anyway?

At some point in your Masonic journey you're going to come to a question of Masonic Landmarks. What are they? Where can you find them? Which of these am I supposed to be upholding under my commitment to maintain and support the Constitution of the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of Arizona?

This answer isn't obvious, and very likely if you ask around, you're going to get different answers.

A simple Google search will yield several results, the most likely frontrunner of which may be the "Landmarks of Freemasonry" of Albert Mackey, from his *Encyclopedia of Freemasonry*. In Mackey's set there are 25 Landmarks.

If you've been doing Masonic esoteric research and looking more on the biblical side, you're likely to run into Deut. 19:14; 27:17; Prov. 22:28, 23:10, Rom. 1:16-17; Eph. 4:24; and Col. 3:17. All of these are references to Landmarks that very likely inspired the Masonic Landmarks, but these are not them.

If you're digging into other States on a State-by-State basis then you're going to come up against some surprising numbers:

Connecticut - 15

Delaware - 25 (see note *)

Florida - 10

Kentucky - 54

Nevada - 39

It seems as with the topic of dinner at the festive board, Masons can't settle firmly on anything. Believe me, I could keep going on the list, but over half of the States do not appear to have any specifically approved Landmarks - so what is a Mason to do?

According to the Arizona Masonic Statutes, Section 1-110, Arizona is a member of the Western Conference of Masonic Grand Lodges, and according to the Conference of Grand Masters of Masons in North America there are definitely three:

Ancient Landmarks

That it subscribes fundamentally, ritualistically and in all its

relations to the Ancient Landmarks, Customs and Usages of the Craft. This requires adherence to the following.

Monotheism -- An unalterable and continuing belief in God.

The Volume of The Sacred Law -- an essential part of the furniture of the Lodge.

Prohibition of the discussion of Religion and Politics.

This is a good list, and solid, but Arizona further complicates the matter. The Grand Lodge of Arizona has 8 "Principles of Recognition" which are:

That such Grand Lodge shall have been established lawfully by a duly recognized Grand Lodge or by three or more regularly constituted Lodges.

That a belief in the GAOTU, and His Revealed Will, shall be an essential qualification for membership.

That all Initiates shall take their obligation on or in full view of the open Volume of the Sacred Law, by which is meant the revelation from above which is binding on the conscience of the particular individual who is being initiated.

That the membership of the Grand Lodge and individual Lodges shall be composed exclusively of men; and that each Grand Lodge shall have no Masonic intercourse of any kind with mixed Lodges or bodies which admit women to membership.

That the Grand Lodge shall have sovereign jurisdiction over the Lodges under its control, i.e., that it shall be a responsible, independent, self-governing organization, with sole and undisputed authority over the Craft of Symbolic Degrees (Entered Apprentice, Fellowcraft and Master Mason) within its jurisdiction; and shall not in any way be subject to or divide such authority with any other power claiming any control or supervision over those degrees.

That the three Great Lights of Freemasonry (namely the

Volume of the Sacred Law, the Square, and the Compasses) shall always be exhibited when the Grand Lodge or its subordinate Lodges are at work, the chief of these being the Volume of the Sacred Law.

That the discussion of religion and politics within the Lodge shall be strictly prohibited.

That the principles of Ancient Landmarks, customs, and usages of the Craft shall be strictly observed.

Taken together the lists are equal as follows.

1 = 2

2=3 and 6

3=7

So, there are three Landmarks, and 8 best practices (to use a modern phrase) reduced to 3 landmarks and 3 Grand Lodge recognition rules taken all together.

As with most Masonic teachings, I'm not going to settle you firmly on an answer to the question in the title of this article, instead, I'm going to let you ponder how many Landmarks Arizona observes and do a little digging yourself. Happy studying!
