GREETINGS FROM THE WEST

Im my search this month for something interesting to present to the brethren. I decided to look at masonry from the newbie perspective and I said to myself where would I start researching the craft. When I first had interest in learning about masonry, I was emphatically told



to stay away from the internet. Many potential candidates are not fortunate enough to have received such sage advice and that is what lead me to this months article. I thought to myself what a newbie do? Of course they are going to "insert search engine here" and find information.

Next, I decided to research "things you may not know about Freemasonry" and the 5th article listed was from Britanica.com. Avoiding the news article (the first 4 results) this seemed a good place to start. This is an excerpt of what I found. I bring this to your attention for it is prudent to understand what is said about the craft and by whom. Having a potential candidate come in and ask about articles etc is common and In my opinion it is important to recognize what is stated or misstated by the public. Would you consider the following excerpt to be informative? Accurate? Helpful? Detrimental?

"Freemasonry, the teachings and practices of the secret fraternal (men-only) order of Free and Accepted Masons, the largest worldwide secret society. Spread by the advance of the <u>British Empire</u>, Freemasonry remains most popular in the <u>British Isles</u> and in other countries originally within the empire. Estimates of the worldwide membership of Freemasonry in the early 21st century ranged from about two million to more than six million.

Freemasonry evolved from the <u>guilds</u> of stonemasons and cathedral builders of the <u>Middle Ages</u>. With the decline of cathedral building, some lodges of operative (working) masons began to accept honorary members to <u>bolster</u>their declining membership. From a few of these lodges developed modern symbolic or speculative Freemasonry, which particularly in the 17th and 18th centuries adopted the rites and trappings of ancient religious orders and of chivalric brotherhoods. In 1717 the first Grand Lodge, an association of lodges, was founded in <u>England</u>.

Freemasonry has, almost from its considerable opposition inception, encountered organized religion, especially from the Roman Catholic Church, and from various states. Freemasonry is not a Christian institution, though it has often been mistaken for such. Freemasonry contains many of the elements of a religion; its teachings enjoin morality, charity, and obedience to the law of the land. In most traditions, the applicant for admission is required to be an adult male, and all applicants must also believe in the existence of a Supreme Being and in the immortality of the soul. In practice, some lodges have been charged with <u>prejudice</u>against <u>Jews</u>, Catholics, and nonwhites. Generally, Freemasonry in Latin countries has attracted those who oppose question religious dogma or who the <u>clergy</u> (see <u>anticlericalism</u>), whereas in the Anglo-Saxon countries the membership is drawn largely from among white Protestants. The modern French tradition, founded in the 19th century and known as Co-Freemasonry or Le Droit Humain, admits both women and men."

A different take on Halloween or as the Gaelic Pagans knew it, Samhain

Samhain is a Gaelic festival marking the end of the harvest season and the beginning of winter or the "darker half" of the year. Traditionally, it is celebrated from 31 October to 1 November, as the Celtic day began and ended at sunset.



Halloween or Samhain falls on October 31st and is when the veil between the world of the living and the world of the dead is believed to be the thinnest. Samhain is all about celebrating the cycle of death and rebirth. In the northern hemisphere, the leaves are dying and nature is preparing for the still of winter. Just the same, in the southern hemisphere, the dormant buds are preparing to rebirth themselves and open to the start of summer. Death and rebirth is an important cycle that is seen in nature constantly, and it's also something that is mirrored within us. We are always going through our own process of shedding, releasing and rebirthing ourselves as we travel along the journey of life. Samhain is a time to honor the "deaths" that we have all experienced throughout the year. It is a time to make peace with all the things we have needed to let go of and to celebrate the cycle of the new.

In Pagan times, Samhain was celebrated as soon as the clock ticked over to November 1st, as it was believed on 1/11 spiritual activity was at its highest. One of the reasons that spiritual activity is so high on this night is due to the vibrations of the date 111. If you look at each number 1 as a pillar, you can see that the middle pillar represents the veil

and "being stuck" between the two worlds. The veil between the living and the dead is also said to be thinnest due to the Sun's position in the deep and intuitive sign of Scorpio. Scorpio energy is all about transformation and honoring the cycles of death and rebirth, but it also rules over the paranormal and our connection to other dimensions and portals.

Going back to the symbolism of the three pillars (111), the darkness that falls between October 31st and November 1st, allows us and other beings to travel between dimensions. This is where the tradition of the jack-o-lanterns and dressing up in costumes arose- people did it to protect themselves from any wandering spirits who could bring them harm. Even though a portal is unlocked at this time of year, Halloween is really a celebration of Mother Nature and the ever evolving energies that live around us and through us. As you know, energy cannot be destroyed instead, it simply shifts from one form to another, and that is exactly what we are called to honor during this sacred time.

In pagan times, important rituals were conducted on Samhain to celebrate death, the gods, the spirits and to understand the connectedness of all beings and creatures in this Universe. Halloween is not a night to be feared however. It is a time to give just a little extra thought to the fact that we are spiritual beings that never die. Instead, we live on in different forms and in different ways. We continually recreate ourselves through the cycles of life. Whatever "deaths" you have experienced this year whether it be death of ideas, loved ones, attitudes, relationships, dreams and so on, Halloween is the perfect time to honor the shift and to honor the new energy that will now be welcomed into your life. Halloween is also a great time to celebrate and remember loved ones who have crossed over. You can do this by lighting a candle, leaving out their favorite food or simply saying a prayer or blessing. October 31st-November 1st is also a powerful time for strengthening your intuition and connection to the Divine, eternal flame within.




