GREETINGS FROM THE WEST

Today's submission will continue with the theme of Earth, the first journey, and the American York Rite: These writings include the rituals as reflected from Pike's blue degrees, The



American York Rite, and The Chamber of Reflection.

Earth Within the American York Rite, it is taught that "our Mother Earth alone, of all the elements, has never proved unfriendly to man." The ritual further admonishes us that "from the earth we came, and to it we must shortly return." The element of earth represents man's alpha and omega, his beginning and his end. Man's body was molded together with the dust of the earth and water. His mortal temple was an earthen clay vessel into which God breathed air through his nostrils to transmute him into a living soul. The first living man was Adam who is recognized within Masonic tradition and myth as being the first Freemason. The name Adam comes from adamah, meaning earth or ground. It may be of interest to mention here that according to Jewish law, it is unlawful for a corpse to be cremated. One explanation for this edict is that a body that is returned to the earth "is capable of bringing forth new life;" whereas, a body that is turned to ash through burning by fire represents complete destruction. The Jewish religion and Freemasonry both teach that man is an eternal being that awaits resurrection Knight Templar 29 after death. It is therefore proper that man's body be laid under the solemn clods of clay as a symbol of his awaiting resurrection and return to the endless cycle of life. It is appropriate that the Masonic rituals of elemental trials begin with the candidate being placed deep within the earth. It may be interpreted as a symbol

of his beginnings. When the profane candidate leaves the Chamber of Reflection, he is born new and prepared to receive instruction as a tabula rasa or blank slate.

From the South

A brief history of Freemasonry as told by The Masonic Society.

During the long period from the time of Charlemagne (about 800) until the



Reformation any man engaged in the building crafts was called a mason, and of these were many kinds including quarrymen, dike builders, wallers, paviors, tilers, and all who could build cottages or barns. Among them all there was a special class of builders who could both design and construct monumental and public buildings such as cathedrals, chapels, churches, mansions, borough halls, etc. These latter were called Freemasons. The name had much the same meaning then that architect has now.

When one of the great public buildings was undertaken, Freemasons were called in from all parts of the kingdom and often from foreign countries. As soon as a sufficient number had signed the rolls, their first step was to erect a building of their own, called the lodge; their next step was to construct cottages for them- selves and their families. Each day, all the workmen received instructions in their lodge room.

Because these Freemasons came from so many different places, and even from other countries, they could not have a permanent local organi- zation of their own, as other craftsmen did; instead, they had what we should now call a society, or a fraternity. There was no single ruler of it; it had no one capital; the members were held together by their general observance of a few rules, regulations, and customs. Modern Freemasonry, such as is practiced in lodges across America, is the direct descendant of that early fraternity.

In those days almost every man admitted to a lodge was a craftsman who made Freemasonry his means of livelihood; such men nowadays are called Operative Masons. As time passed, however, lodges here and there began to admit into membership a few men who did not follow Freemasonry as a means of livelihood, but were attracted to it for other reasons, and largely because of its antiquity and its fellowship; such were called "Accepted" Masons; and also were called "Speculative" Masons, a name which always had meant an understanding of the ideas and principles of Freemasonry. It is for such historical reasons that members of the Fraternity today are called Free & Accepted Masons.

By 1700 the number of Speculative (or Accepted) members had become so preponderant in most of the lodges in Britain that when the first Grand Lodge of the world was set up in London, England, in 1717, the whole Fraternity ceased to draw any distinction between Operatives and Speculatives; any man, otherwise qualified, and regardless of his means of livelihood, could become a Mason. That has been true ever since.

The history of Freemasonry therefore falls into three periods. In the first period all Free- masons, with very few exceptions, were Operatives, by which is meant that they made architecture their means of livelihood. In the second period the membership of the lodges was a mixture of Operatives and Speculatives. In the third period, beginning in 1717, it has been wholly Speculative. The one principle which unites the three periods is the fact that through - out its history Freemasonry has always been a fraternity - a fraternity, nothing more, nothing less, and nothing other.

The form of Freemasonry which thus descended directly from the Operative lodges of a thousand or so years ago is known as Ancient Craft Freemasonry; it is organized in Grand Lodges and local lodges. During the last quarter of the eighteenth century a number of branches grew out of that parent trunk, and in the course of time each one developed an independent form of organization of its own. Each of these appendant bodies is called a Rite.

In the United States there are four such appendant Rites in addition to Ancient Craft Freemasonry. The Cryptic Rite is organized in the form of a General Grand Council, a Grand Council for each of the larger number of states, and local councils. The Capitular Rite, which is better known as the Royal Arch, is organized in the form of a General Grand Chapter, a Grand Chapter for each of the larger number of states, and local chapters.






Scottsdale Lodge Memories

One of the most interesting things in the library is a gavel. O.C. Wilson was one of the founders of Scottsdale Lodge 43 and it's first Worshipful Master. He used this gavel in the first year, 1950, and likely at the meetings when the Lodge was being formed. The gavel was around the Lodge for many years and used by Wardens and some Worshipful Masters. It is unusual because it is one piece tree with a 90 degree branch or a branch with a smaller 90 degree branch. In the tear 2000, 50 years later, Worshipful Master Chuck Squires ordered the gavel not be used any more, except if an incoming Master wanted to use it at his installation. The gavel is in great condition and should last many more years if used at the most once a year. When it was taken out of service it was taken down to Wood Workers World to see what the wood actually was. They took it and studied it for some time and could not tell us what kind of tree it came from. This is just one of the interesting artifacts in the library.
