Brethren,

The Summer months are coming to a close, which means we all make our return back to lodge! It will be great to get back into the swing of things, and so see everybody again. I look forward to help Brothers become better men, and help them accomplish their goals.

Please enjoy this piece from WB Scott S Dueball, about the meaning the Silence.

At the beginning of Advent we heard Luke 1:11-25 and a sermon accompanying it. In this passage Zechariah is visited by Gabriel at an altar of incense. Gabriel informs Zechariah that his wife will give birth to John (the Baptist). When Zechariah questions the authenticity of Gabriel's message, Gabriel makes Zechariah silent until John's birth.

I all but completely missed this until the sermon called to my attention that the purpose of this silence may not have been punish Zechariah's lack of faith but to encourage him to listen. This explanation caught my attention as it is present in Masonry and many of the old mystical traditions. Members of the Pythagorean community had to complete a 5 year period of silence. Many eastern and western traditions incorporate various modes of meditation which seek to increase mindfulness of the present. As Masons, the theme of silence is prevalent throughout the degrees. Similar to the story of Zechariah, silence can be understood through a punitive lens but I posit that the concept of listening without the burden of having to respond is of greater value to us as Masons and humans.

In the social media age we have been given a microphone without any instruction to listen (or think) first. I am just as guilty as anyone of feeling the need to respond to EVERYTHING. There is a fine line between things that are necessary to correct and things that likely won't be solved by offering my opinion (or even facts). We miss out on a great many things when we become enamored by our own words.

As we approach this season of renewal (be that Christmas, Solstice, Chanukah or any other winter celebration), let us remember to listen to the beauty of the world surrounding us. The nights are getting longer and colder but soon the Sun will rise and give way to new beauty and warmth. Let us each commit to spending more time in silence and appreciating the sounds of yule


FROM THE LIBRARY







We will be initiating 3 new members in October. If you are interested in additional information regarding Eastern Star, please call our Worthy Matron, Linda or myself.





Shayne Revers was just accepted into a prestigious Scientist-Astronaut training program based in Melbourne, Florida called PoSSUM. Only fifteen applicants were accepted out of thousands from all over the world to attend the program this Fall.

The program is offered by the International Institute for Astronautical Sciences (IIAS) and is the world's first institutional sponsor of a commercial human-tended research spaceflight.

Program highlights include two simulations of weightlessness. One is scuba diving with a space suit and the other is climbing towards the edge of the atmosphere in an aircraft to experience zero gravity for several minutes.

As an aspirant of space travel(Mars particularly), Shayne has been creating important relationships with NASA astronauts as well some from the Apollo space program.

Once Shayne discovered that Freemasons were involved in the American space program every step of the way, his curiosity piqued and he started to become enlightened with Masonic books and documentaries. On his own free will and accord, he knocked on the door of Scottsdale #43 one night, but the door did not open for him until a few years later when he randomly encountered a brother from the lodge that invited him in.

Shayne is currently attending ASU to receive his second Bachelor's Degree in Geo-Science and a Master's degree in Geo-Hydrology.

The ancient Roman philosopher and statesman Lucius Seneca dedicated an entire series of letters to his friend Paulinus on the very subject of the brevity of Life. The collection, in the modern era is sometimes called "On the Shortness of Life" or "On the Shortness of Time."

In the collection, Seneca outlines the various ways in which we waste the only resource we truly command – time. But perhaps the most meaningful passage to me comes from his third letter:

> Men do not suffer anyone to seize their estates, and they rush to stones and arms if there is even the slightest dispute about the limit of their lands, yet they allow others to trespass upon their life – nay, they even lead in those times who will eventually possess it. No one is found who is willing to distribute his money, yet among how many does each one of us distribute his life.

We give our time to football games that we watch alone in the privacy of our homes – to what end? We seldom spend more than a few seconds discussing the highlights with friends, but we've dedicated hours to the watching. We've done no self-improvement, we've done nothing to support, protect, or aid our fellow man.

We give our time (often as unpaid overtime) to our employers, when there is nothing returned to us except a moment on our death bed when we realize that we worked too much while we laughed and loved too little.

> No one on his deathbed ever said, 'I wish I had spent more time on my business.' – Arnold Zack, as quoted by Paul Tsongas in his Memoir "Heading Home"

Our time is the only resource we have – and we don't know how much of it is available for us to use for ourselves and our families or offer to the world. It is such a small amount of time too! A man is only allotted about three score and ten years. Beyond that only the Creator grants additional time, and He can take us into the Celestial Lodge above at any moment before that. Would He approve of the ways we leveraged the use of our twenty-four-inch gauge during the time He permitted us to work in His quarries?
