This in itself is a divine reflection of what we are looking for inside. Apotheosis means the elevation of someone to divine status; deification. To take a good man and make him better. To better understand this I want to share an excerpt from one of our very own.

Apotheosis of Washington

This is a brief introduction in to The 47th Problem of Euclid. We hear about in the third degree, but who was Euclid, and what was The 47th Problem?



To non-Freemasons, the 47th Problem of Euclid may be somewhat mysterious. It's represented by what appear to be 3 squares. The 47th Problem of Euclid, is also known as the "Pythagorean Theorem".

Euclid was a Greek mathematician born about 325 BC in Tyre, or Megara, and died about 265 BC. He is referred to as Euclid of Alexandria, and taught at Ptolemy's university in Alexandria, Egypt. Euclid was known as "the most prominent mathematician of Greco-Roman antiquity."

We are told that Euclid, (the Father of Geometry), who lived several hundred years AFTER Pythagoras, worked long and hard to solve the 3:4:5: ratio puzzle. A 3-4-5 right triangle is a triangle whose side lengths are in the ratio of 3:4:5. In other words, a 3-4-5 triangle has the ratio of the sides in whole numbers called Pythagorean Triples.

Euclid's Elements of Geometry (a series of 13 books) is one of the most influential works in the history of Mathematics, particularly Geometry. Euclid's Elements (c. 300 BCE) presented a set of formal logical arguments based on a few basic terms and axioms, provided a systematic method of rational exploration that guided mathematicians,

The statue of Washington as Zeus was placed in the Capitol Rotunda from 1841 until 1843, when it was moved due to public outcry. That statue now resides in the Smithsonian complex.

The deification of Washington was not yet finished, though. The Capitol dome, was not completed until 1863, twenty years after the Washington-as-Zeus statue was moved. In 1865, Italian artist Constantino Brumidi painted a massive fresco, "The Apotheosis of Washington," 180 feet above the floor of the rotunda.

It helps to put the dates in perspective. When the Capitol dome was completed in 1863, the Civil War was raging and the Union was suffering many defeats. The war ended in April 1865, and Lincoln was assassinated just a few days later. Brumidi began his painting at the beginning of 1865, just before the end of the war.

The painting depicts George Washington becoming a god, which is the meaning of *apotheosis*. There is rich symbolism in this painting. The painting is a circumpunct, that is, a point within a circle. The circumpunct is an ancient symbol and has many meanings, including Ra, the Egyptian God; the Sun; Divine Order; the Eye of God by Early Christians; and Keter or Primary Will, the chief Sephirot from the Kabbalah.

In the center, Washington is flanked by the goddesses Victory and Liberty. Forming a circle around these three are thirteen maidens, each representing one of the thirteen original colonies. Some of them have their backs turned to Washington, representing those colonies which had seceded from the Union. At the top, two of the maidens are holding a banner reading "E Pluribus Unum" (out of many, one).

Composing the outer ring are six scenes. Beginning directly beneath Washington, and moving clockwise, they are War, Science, Marine, Commerce, Mechanics, and Agriculture.

In War, the woman Freedom, with a shield of our national colors and a sword and assisted by a fierce eagle, is fighting and trampling Tyranny and Despotism.

Similar symbolic details are in the other scenes which include the gods and goddesses Minerva, Neptune, Venus, Mercury, Vulcan, Ceres, and Flora as well as American scientists and industrialists. And thus it is, as Washington is ascending toward the heavens, toward Olympus, he is surrounded by his peers, gods, and goddesses.

philosophers, and scientists well into the 19th century. It has influenced all branches of science but none so much as mathematics and the exact sciences. The Elements have been studied 24 centuries in many languages starting, of course, in the original Greek, then in Arabic, Latin, and many modern languages.

Euclid understood that building a logical and rigorous geometry depends on the foundation. —a foundation that Euclid began in Book I with 23 definitions (such as "a point is that which has no part" and "a line is a length without breadth"), five unproved assumptions that Euclid called postulates also known as axioms, and five further unproved assumptions that he called common notions.

In Euclid's great work, the Elements, the only tools employed for geometrical constructions were the ruler and the compass—a restriction retained in elementary Euclidean geometry to this day.

The essence of The 47th Problem of Euclid is about the importance of establishing an architecturally true foundation based on use of the square.

To a Mason, The 47th Problem of Euclid teaches one to square themselves when their square gets out of square.



Masonic Education

Paul Revere

Born on January 8, 1735, the child of Huguenot parents who fled France to avoid religion persecution, Paul Revere was educated in Boston and followed in his father's footsteps to become a Gold and Silversmith.

He was an inventor, a colonel of artillery, and a patriot who fought in the American Revolutionary War.

When the Continental Army acquired cannon for which there were no available carriages, Revere invented a new style of carriage to get the cannon into the field and usable for the fight for Independence. When the Continental Navy needed a better solution for the hull of the ship that came to be known as Old Ironsides, Revere invented a new process for stamp rolling copper sheeting.

He was known for casting church bells, many of which are still in existence. He made silverware that is still in use in many northeastern families to this day.

His skills in scrollwork and other forms of inscribed metal work are well known and famous still.

He was made an Entered Apprentice Mason in St. Andrew's Lodge on September 4, 1760 and was the first Entered Apprentice made in that Lodge. In 1784 he was a founding member, and the first Master of Rising States Lodge. He made the Jewels for this Lodge and engraved and printed certificates of memberships and other notices for the Lodge. He served as Grand Master of Massachusetts from 1795 to 1797 and assisted in the laying of the Cornerstone of the Massachusetts State House on July 4, 1795.
