GREETINGS FROM THE WEST

It's June and we will be dark soon. This is a good time to rest from our labors, recharge our batteries and make plans for the rest of the year. There will be summer projects which need to be attended to and we will be traveling to a few Lodges that we are not able to attend during the regular year.

Speaking of plans for the rest of the year, at the May stated meeting I announced that anyone who is interested in being considered for an officer position next year should let me know now. My decision of who will be in the various appointed positions rests on interest and aptitude. During the second half of the year, we traditionally give officers the chance to show they are ready for the next position by moving up a chair or by taking on parts of the ritual that are normally done by others. Any Master Mason who believes they will make a good Master of the Lodge should contact me. Each position in the officer line teaches skills and is a proving ground to show the rest of the Lodge you have what it takes. By the way, this also goes for committee chairmen and members. It takes a lot of committees to run the Lodge and we need dedicated volunteers to help make those committees effective.

As an example, the Education Committee gave a Masonic Education on Funerals and planning for that eventuality not only for Lodge members, but their spouses. We handed out some brochures, we explained the rights of a Mason, what the options are for his apron and pointed out how important it is for the spouse to know not only the desires on what type of service but the location of important Masonic jewelry, aprons and other items needed during the service and the burial. To assist with communicating this, we have a form that should be filled out and a copy submitted to the Lodge. This form has been uploaded to the Scottsdale 43 Website along with the broacher from the Masonic Service Association that can be given to clergy or the funeral home to help them understand what part Masons can assist with in the funeral service. Look under "Lodge Media" on the website, in the folder called Articles.

The first round of the mentoring certification class has concluded with a slide presentation that originated from Grand Lodge and was adapted for Scottsdale 43 by explaining the resources we have available to us and the Mentoring Training Program we have in place. We also were sharing experiences we have had with our candidates and some of the questions they ask or the guidance they seek. Another round of the Mentor Training Program will begin again in fall.

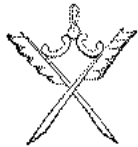
From the Secretary's Desk

Masonic Education

Brother James Monroe

Leading the charge at the Battle of Trenton, a musket ball struck his shoulder, hitting an artery. He recovered and continued to fight for General and Bro. George Washington, becoming friends with French officer Bro. Lafayette.

His name was James Monroe, born April 28, 1758. Initiated on November 9, 1775, St. John's Regimental Lodge in the Continental Army. Bro. Monroe was not yet eighteen, but "lawful age" had not yet been universally fixed at twenty-one. Later, Bro. Monroe took Membership in Williamsburg Lodge No. 6, Williamsburg, Virginia.

After the Revolution, Bro. Monroe studied law under Thomas Jefferson, was elected Senator, Governor of Virginia and Secretary of State, where he negotiated the Louisiana Purchase.

Responsible for the Monroe Doctrine, Bro. Monroe was elected the 5th U.S. President. He stated in his Inaugural Address, March 4, 1817:

"I enter on the trust to which I have been called by the suffrages of my fellow-citizens with my fervent prayers to the Almighty that He will be graciously pleased to continue to us that protection which He has already so conspicuously displayed."

In his First Annual Message to Congress, 1817, President and Bro. James Monroe stated:

"For advantages so numerous and highly important it is our duty to unite in grateful acknowledgments to that Omnipotent Being from whom they are derived, and in unceasing prayer that He will endow us with virtue and strength to maintain and hand them down in their utmost purity to our latest posterity."

Instead of appeasement, President and Bro. James Monroe, March 5, 1821, used the U.S. Navy to suppress terrorist attacks from Muslim Barbary Pirates: "Our relations with the Barbary Powers are preserved ... by the same means that were employed when I came into this office. As early as 1801 it was found necessary to send a squadron into the Mediterranean for the protection of our commerce."

In his 5th Annual Message, December 3, 1821, President and Bro. James Monroe reiterated:

"A squadron has been maintained in the Mediterranean, by means whereof peace has been preserved with the Barbary Powers ... From past experience ... it is distinctly understood that should our squadron be withdrawn they would soon recommence their hostilities and depredations upon our commerce."

In 1823, President and Bro. James Monroe, with the U.S. Congress, ordered Decatur, Alabama, to be founded in honor of Commodore and Bro. Stephen Decatur, the renowned U.S. Naval officer who forced the Muslim pirates to surrender, ending the Barbary Wars.

PROPOSED BY-LAW CHANGES FOR SCOTTSDALE MASONIC LODGE #43

Article V

Elections and Appointments

~~Section 4: An elected officer of this lodge may be removed from office for intentional and willful disregard of the bylaws of the lodge and the Constitution and Statutes of the Grand Lodge of Arizona, under Section 13-301 of the RAMS.~~

Article VI

Fees and Dues

~~Section 1: The sum of three hundred dollars (\$300.00)~~ **three hundred and fifty dollars (\$350.00)** shall be paid in advance and accompany the petition of the applicant. The application shall be accompanied by all Grand Lodge fees and assessments in addition to any fees required by Scottsdale Lodge #43 for membership. **No petition for the degrees will be presented before the lodge without proper fees having first been submitted with the petition.**

~~Section 2: The fee for the petition for affiliation of one hundred dollars~~ **one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150.00)** plus the annual Grand Lodge per-capita shall accompany the petition for affiliation. An applicant for affiliation shall be in good standing, as defined under Section 5-106 of the Constitution of the Grand Lodge of Arizona. **No petition for affiliation will be presented before the lodge without proper fees having first been submitted with the petition.**

~~Section 3: The dues of this Lodge shall be one hundred dollars (\$100.00)~~ **one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150.00)** per year. The annual Grand Lodge per-capita shall accompany the dues, payable annually, in advance.

~~Section 4: An amount equal to fifteen per cent (15%) of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00)~~ of the annual dues shall be deposited in a building maintenance fund. This fund is specifically set aside for the upkeep and maintenance of the real properties of the lodge. No other use of said fund will be authorized unless a financial hardship exists and then only when approved by a two-thirds (2/3) majority of the members present at a regular stated meeting of the lodge.

~~Section 8: Any brother in good standing may withdraw from membership by paying his dues and notifying the Lodge. in writing to that effect at a stated meeting, but as provided under Section 9-301 and 9-302 of the RAMS of the Grand Lodge of Arizona, no recommendation shall be issued unless ordered by the Lodge.~~

Article VII

Committees and their Duties

~~Section 1: The Master and Wardens shall be a Charity Committee and shall have power to draw upon the Treasurer, for any sum not exceeding two hundred fifty (\$250.00) at any one time~~ **the current amount in the Distressed Master Masons, Widows, and Orphans fund**, for the relief of a distressed worthy Brother, his widow, or orphan(s). Every warrant so drawn by the Master shall be reported to the Lodge, at its next stated meeting, and entered upon the minutes thereof.

~~Section 2: The Master shall, annually, appoint a Finance and Budget Committee, consisting of at least three members, at least two (2) of whom shall be officers of the Lodge. The most senior officer appointed to the committee shall be the chairman thereof. It shall be their duty to examine all accounts presented against the Lodge and to make their recommendations to the Lodge to authorize or disapprove such payment, prior to payment thereof,~~ **and any other duties assigned by the Master in regards to lodge finances.**

When acting in the capacity of a **Finance and Budget** committee, said committee, at the discretion of the Chairman, may take unto itself, suitable assistance as may be deemed necessary, for the purpose of preparation of said budget, to insure its preparation in a fair, equitable, and expeditious manner. Such assistants to serve at the will and pleasure of the Chairman, and are not permanent members thereof.

~~Section 5: The Master shall appoint other committees as necessary.~~ **Special Committees - As the Worshipful Master is absolute in the government of his Lodge; he has the power, right and prerogative to appoint any and all special committees and designate the personnel of any and all such special committees he may appoint.**

Article XI

Of the Treasurer

~~Section 1.1: The Treasurer shall annually, as soon as practical after his installation, secure signature cards from the banking institution where the Lodge may have accounts. These cards are to be executed requiring any two signatures of the following, to validate a financial transaction with said institution; Master, Senior Warden, Junior Warden, Secretary, or Treasurer.~~

Article XII

Board of Trustees

~~Section 7: The Trustees shall have charge of the physical operation and maintenance of the Temple. The Board shall also have the power to expend in necessary improvements and repairs in and about the property of the Lodge; such sums of money as may be required, not exceeding the sum of five hundred (\$500.00)~~ **one thousand (\$1,000)** dollars in any one transaction. The Board shall not have the power to purchase or sell real estate on behalf of the Lodge unless, and until, specifically authorized by the Lodge, and shall not, without the consent of the Lodge, first being had, sell or otherwise dispose of any property of the Lodge, where the transaction involves one hundred (\$100.00) or more; with the provision that the property that may be deemed of historical value by the Board must be referred to the History Committee for review, prior to disposal thereof, regardless of intrinsic value.

Article XV

Amendments

~~Section 2: Written notification of by law changes must be sent to all members of Scottsdale #43 via U.S. Mail immediately after the proposal has been announced. Notification of proposed amendments to the by-laws shall be presented in writing and be distributed and/or read at a stated communication. The lodge shall then send notification of proposed amendments to members of Scottsdale #43 via the Trestleboard and e-mail. Notification of the proposed amendments to the by-laws must also be placed on the lodge website. The notification shall include all proposed changes and the date of the stated meeting of which proposed by-law amendments will be voted on.~~
