REPORT: Summer 2017 Work Projects at the Lodge

To all those who participated in the 2017 Summer Work Projects, thank you!

Each week we had between 15 and 25 people with enough work to keep everyone busy.

We met each Thursday in July and Aug, finishing the final pieces on Aug 17th.

Once we knew how many people showed up, we got the pizza, chicken or sandwiches for a light meal.

There was plenty of supervision available so we know the work got done correctly.

As usual, the Jobbies volunteered to give the kitchen a thorough cleaning and we appreciate their efforts.

The work effort was coordinated by Brothers John Favara and Stephen Clarke.

The list contained some of the following items: general clean-up (dusting, washing surfaces, removing stains), painting (exterior south wall, women's restroom, graffiti removal, touch up on "G"), sanding/refinishing the WM Pedestal, electrical work (replacing burnt out bulbs, cleaning fixtures, dimmer switch, repairing OES light), reconciling Grand Lodge records with our files and writing operations procedures.

In addition to these efforts, the Trustees recommended and the Lodge voted to replace the dining room carpet with tile for maintainability and durability.

The tile chosen was a wood look porcelain and was professionally installed.

All the brothers had to do was - remove the base boards, remove the cabinets, re-stain and re-install the baseboards, replace the cabinets and seal the grout.

The installers did a beautiful job as did the brothers who assisted in the work.

There was a concern that tile would make the room very noisy, but it did not!

The installers explained that industrial carpet with a tight loop is almost as loud as a hard surface.

Summer work projects and Brotherhood

This is a somewhat abbreviated account of some Navy experiences of PM David Woodland.

It was the end of May 1943, high school graduation in about a month, WWII in full mode, and every male student who had reached eighteen was drafted, but deferred until graduation. I was still seventeen, enlisted in the Navy, and off to boot camp the beginning of June. After a short boot camp, I was notified that my aptitude scores were good enough to be sent to Chicago U. to learn radar, a brand new science. For some reason I soon regretted, I turned it down, and attended torpedo school. Afterward, sent to San Diego for advanced training. From there, it was to Houston to commission a new destroyer escort ship, and I was rated Torpedoman 3rd. class. Destroyer escorts were a scaled version of a destroyer, originally meant for slow freighter defense against enemy submarines. By now, they were scaled up and armed to become smaller destroyers. Following shakedown exercises in Bermuda, it was through the Panama Canal to the Pacific, and the war. First the battle of the Philippine Sea, and partner to the smaller aircraft carrier Anzio. Our mission was anti submarine. The first sinking was the sub that had sunk the American cruiser on which the five Sullivan brothers perished. Our duty was continual anti sub patrol, but also contained the invasions of Luzon, Formosa, Mindoro, Iwo Jima, and Okinawa. It was off the Philippines, when "Halsey's Typhoon", a storm with 244 mph winds, struck, sinking three destroyers within minutes. It was then I was ordered to go on deck and fasten one of my depth charges. As I was heading out, I was stopped by an older chief petty officer, who tied a rope on me. Two steps on deck, and I was blown overboard. I have no memory of being in the water, or being rescued. My memory returned about four hours later. I did not learn my rescuer's name for sixty years, and then by accident. My family and I met and spent time with him, an inexpressible experience. It became July of 1945, and we were still there, the bombs had been dropped, and we joined the invasion force waiting to invade Japan. Then on August 14, 1945, Japan surrendered. Just prior to this, Japan sent the largest sub ever built, containing five kamikaze planes in a sealed hanger, to bomb the Panama Canal and deter troop ships from the European theater. Our ship sunk it one day out of Tokyo Bay.

Instead of returning to the U.S., the next day we were in South Korea. The country had been completely looted by North Korea under the Russians. Two weeks later while escorting an admiral who was inspecting conditions on the China Coast, we entered Manchuria by sea. The Manchurian army, which had been armed and trained by the Russians, machine gunned us. Those were the first shots of the Cold War. Surprise! Five year's later, the Korean War.

It now was December 1945, almost two years of non stop operations, no port, no leave, no liberty. The war was over for five months, and we were still there. By now, I was torpedoman second class, and ship's helmsman. I helped steer the ship to San Francisco, under the Golden Gate Bridge in fog so heavy, I went through by radar, never seeing the bridge. Dry-dock for repairs, no leave again, six weeks later a troop train to New York, and the separation center for discharge. Twenty-three hundred names were called, but not mine. Who are you, they asked. "We don't know who you are, they said. You are going to the brig they yelled". Eight days later, still in the brig, I saw an AfroAmerican sailor with bright red hair. I called out "Red Lucas", from my high school class, and it was him. It happened he was the brig clerk, a call to Washington, and I was out the next day.

Four years to a degree under the GI Bill, sixty years in business, and here I am.

Indeed, one of our Brothers and part of the Greatest Generation




