This signification of purity and innocence reminds me of something so essential and emblematically Masonic - the lambskin or white leathern apron (also somewhat interesting to note that both April and Apron consist of five letters and start with the letter "A"). It said that the Masonic apron represents the purity and innocence we are expected to pursue in life as a Freemason; that rectitude of conduct and record of actions as pure and spotless as the fair emblem itself. A tall order indeed, but it is the essential pursuit and singular mentality required of us, as Masons, to be worthy of being bestowed just such an honor.

The Masonic apron represents our beginning and our end, the Alpha and the Omega of the Masonic experience. We receive our lambskins immediately as brothers first-born. We are instructed that they are to be worn through an honorable life, and at our death to be placed upon the coffin which contains our earthly remains.

In Encyclopedia of Freemasonry, Dr Albert Mackey writes, "There is no one of the symbols of Speculative Masonry more important in its teachings, or more interesting in its history, than the lambskin, or white leather apron. Commencing its lessons at an early period in the Mason's progress, it is impressed upon his memory as the first gift which he receives, the first symbol which is explained to him, and the first tangible evidence which he possesses of his admission into the Fraternity."

This is the spring-time of our brotherhood, our Masonic April, and despite the fear of stepping out into the unknown and newly bloomed, the newly openminded and initiated stride forward with the positive injunction to prepare the soil and plant the seeds to be harvested in our coming fall. Masonic Education

The Marine Corps has a saying: "We're looking for a few good men" We as Masons say." We make good men better" additionally, over the years Masons did not advertise or solicit men to join, men had to ask three times to join.

My Brothers times have changed and the composition of Lodges has also changed. Historically, if you traveled around our country you would have seen most Lodges, in spite of the words in our ritual, were homogenous in their membership. Some were not open to certain men e.g. Jewish men, Catholic men and men of color, etc. to their local Lodge membership. Today we see in Scottsdale Lodge and others, men from all backgrounds, educational, ethnic, sexual orientation and racial backgrounds that believe in a supreme being, yet we still have an issue of "recruitment and retention" of members for many reasons.

Recruitment One of the best ways to attract men to Masonry is for lodges and individual members to be visible in their community organizations and not hide the fact of their membership in Masonic organizations. Participation in clubs, community events like parades, wearing Masonic labeled shirts, and lapel pins etc. all help. A famous general said "Lead by example". If we hold to our Masonic teachings, men will look to Masonry to improve themselves and be like the role models we strive to be and seek membership in a Masonic lodge. Let men know we have a SEEKERS group they can come to and learn about Masonry.

Retention This starts with the leaders of the lodge and goes down to each member. We are all responsible for encouraging our Brothers to participate in Lodge activities as best they can. A variety of activities, e.g. a sick and goodwill committee to call or visit Brothers who we don't see in Lodge, family based events, athletic teams as well as computer or tables games, updating our mail, email and phone contact list needs to be ongoing. Unpaid dues can be due to many factors and those Brothers need to be reached out to. There is no limit on what can be done. Scottsdale Lodge is a great example this. We are in parades, have a monthly pancake breakfast, Bikes for Books program a yearly family picnic and much more. We can always do better and by having established committees with a continuity of members in place. We cannot let ourselves become complacent, expecting men to just come to us or members once raised, will never leave.




