From the South

February - the oddball, our second month, the month that seems to disagree with all other months. When commerce emphasizes romance and relationships.



It is true Masonry spends much time on the numbers - 3,

5, & 7. Still, the number "Two" is also one of the most frequently represented numbers in our craft. Indeed even in life itself, vis-à-vis: opening vs closing, "the high and the low," "the rich and the poor," the points of the compasses, the sides of the square, physical vs spiritual and myriad more. Polarities are likely as infinite as the cosmos itself. In popular reference, the number "Two" very often implies an undesirable - confusion (he was of two minds), conflict (two wrongs don't make a right), infidelity (two-timer), cruelty (two can play at that game) ...etc.

However, in clear concert with this view - wherever there is a negative, there must also be its corresponding positive. Without two *points* there would be no *line*, and thus no progress beyond the line, to a completed structure. Two, while it provides us with opposing forces, also provides us with the opportunity for relationship. In our Second degree there is a deeply moving spectacle, in which we ourselves act out a similitude of this. At a certain point the Mason is guided through two iconic representations of polarities - while we give these polarities names unique to mysticism, they might be referenced by a number of various ideals -Power vs Constraint, Assemblage and Dispersement, Severity vs Grace. We, the progressing Masonic Man, are in that moment - the alchemical force which brings the two into relation with one another, as we stand squarely justified between the two forces, bringing them into an agreement.

The poet Robert Bly gives some beautiful prose on this theme of - *Living in the Opposites* in his essay work on masculinity and initiation - <u>Iron John</u>. Discussing Pythagoras' love for duality and his careful list of opposites, he outlines - "Male and female make up one pair, the light and the dark another, the one and the many another, the odd and even another...Rejoicing in the opposites means pushing the opposites apart with our imaginations so as to create space, and then enjoying the fantastic music coming from each side. One gets a sense of the power of that by sitting between a sitar and a tabla when both are giving off music."

In the degree, while we stand (even for a moment) in this state of balance,

we might extend our arms (as Bly illustrates) and emblematically touch the both of these polar representations, tying them together by the space the Mason occupies in the between. In this place, neither one of these symbolic ideals holds greater or lesser sway over us, we ourselves become the middle pillar, bringing symmetry to the spectacle. Yet, if we but deviate even the slightest degree from this place of equity, balance, justice, and beauty, we easily loose touch with one or the other of the powers, destroying the symmetry, compromising the agreement and allowing one of these powerful forces to come in on us.

I am certain that we can each recall a time in our lives when we have leaned to one side or the other in our own internal polarities, focuses, or attention. I am also certain that we would be remiss not to recognize that in these seasons of imbalance, it is difficult to maintain harmonious ties within ourselves, let alone the various circles in which we live and operate. Much as a magnet out of occlusion with surrounding magnetized bodies,

we find ourselves in a state of repulsion and it may even appear as though we are *being* repelled. While the truth may be more likely that we are largely responsible for our circumstance and trajectory.

In this month when we are reminded of the duality of life and even the dual natures within the us, perhaps we will be also reminded to take evaluation within our own temples (either for strength or ornament) to find means whereby we might enhance harmony between our polar forces. And as we do, thereby better suit ourselves for union and agreement within our larger temples - our families, our Lodge, our communities, and ultimately within the designs of the Creator.



This is the story of one of the great books in our library. On November 7, 1996, Deputy Grand Master Bill Jeffers made an official visit to our Lodge. On this visit he presented a copy of 'BORN IN BLOOD" to sitting Master Jesse Lee with the following inscription "To W.M. Jesse B. Lee and the Brother of Scottsdale Lodge #43. May the history of our great Fraternity light the future", signed Bill Jefferies. I have no record of how many times this great book was borrowed and returned, but the last time it was signed out was October 2, 2004. It staved on our Brothers shelf for some time. He was transferred to Mexico when he was transferred there. Then it traveled to Texas when he was transferred there. It was mailed to Scottsdale Lodge on October 14. 2021. It is in the Library and I recommend this to anyone and especially Master Masons who want to see John J. Robinson's explanation of where Masons started.






