



Freemasons: Founders of the United States



LABEL-LIBEL-LEGAL

We all begin life's journey with a name, formed by whatever reasons, given, recorded, and legalized. It is you forever label, what you are called, and how identified. Maybe modified by nicknames, sometimes pejoratively, but still your shadow.

Ensuing is the sort of life you lead, and how you are perceived. In short, your character. These perceptions will probably lead to some descriptive labels, hopefully endearing, others lower in scale, and meant to demean and punish, ever libelous. At this point, use and intent come into view.




