Summer is officially here. Well, at least its temperatures are. Phoenix summers always remind me of my favorite out of town family member who visits too long. It's great when they first arrive, but after a while it just becomes too much.

Here are a few ways to help survive the summer.

Hikes to beat the heat

1) **Slide Rock State Park**: This is a 0.3-mile trail with a difficulty rating of moderate. Slide Rock State Park features a natural rock water slide located in Oak Creek Canyon just 15 minutes from Sedona and 40 minutes from Flagstaff. Slide Rock State Park was originally the Pendley Homestead and is a primitive route running along Oak Creek. This extremely popular area features a natural water slide along Oak Creek.

2) Old Caves Crater Trail: This is a 3.5-mile loop trail near Flagstaff, Arizona. Generally considered a moderately challenging route, it takes an average of 1 h 36 min to complete. From the trailhead, Old Caves Crater Trail takes you through volcanic cinder fields and Ponderosa Pines to the base of an extinct cinder cone volcano. As you climb Old Caves Crater the vegetation changes to a mix of mostly pinion and juniper trees with a few ponderosas. The trail heads towards the base of the cinder cone, then travels up the side where you'll encounter switchbacks before it turns towards the interior of the crater and up to the rim.

Stay Healthy

1) **Drink Water**: Phoenix is a desert. Drinking water is imperative to our survial, particularly during the summer. According to The Mayo Clinic a man should drink about 124 oz of water per day, and woman should drink 92 oz of water per day. Another way to think about it is that one should drink 0.5-1 oz water per pound of body weight. For example, a 200 pound man should drink 100-200 oz of water per day.

Q: How do I know if I'm drinking enough?

A: Your fluid intake is probably adequate if:

- ☐ You rarely feel thirsty
- ☐ Your urine is colorless or light yellow
- 2) **Wear sunscreen:** The sun's rays cause skin cancer. Although the best sunscreen in shade, make it a habit to always wear sunscreen. May lotions include some SPF protection.
- 3) **Beware of Heat Stroke**: Heatstroke is a condition caused by your body overheating, usually as a result of prolonged exposure to or physical exertion in high temperatures. This most serious form of heat injury, heatstroke, can occur if your body temperature rises to 104 F (40 C) or higher. Many of the reported heat strokes during the summer are from "in-shape" males who are pushing themselves too hard in the sun. If you are going to work outside work in the early morning and drink plenty of water.

Heatstroke signs and symptoms include:

- \square High body temperature. A core body temperature of 104 F (40 C) or higher, obtained with a rectal thermometer, is the main sign of heatstroke.
- ☐ Altered mental state or behavior. Confusion, agitation, slurred speech, irritability, delirium, seizures and coma can all result from heatstroke.
- ☐ Alteration in sweating. In heatstroke brought on by hot weather, your skin will feel hot and dry to the touch. However, in heatstroke brought on by strenuous exercise,

your skin may feel dry or slightly moist.

☐ Nausea and vomiting. You may feel sick to your stomach or vomit.

☐ Flushed skin. Your skin may turn red as your body temperature increases.

☐ Rapid breathing. Your breathing may become rapid and shallow.

☐ Racing heart rate. Your pulse may significantly increase because heat stress places a tremendous burden on your heart to help cool your body.

☐ Headache. Your head may throb.

How should Masons meet?

"There ain't no good guys, there ain't no bad guys; there's only you and me and we just disagree."

Summer is approaching! In

Arizona, this is especially a time of intensity and strength in our Sun's power and effect on us. It is also the time of refreshment and repose, as this time brings to our Lodge a break from usual Business and Ritual. As I look forward to this time, I consider the trek of the past year and lessons learned since. In my revery, I am reminded of my many lessons in communication and forgiveness.

I recently heard the above quote from a song, being played at a restaurant. It made me think of a parable I heard a number of years ago that went something like this...

Once upon a time there were two brothers who lived on adjoining farms. John, the elder and William was the younger. They had spent nearly their entire lives working side by side. One day a small misunderstanding arose between them. Unfortunately, the conflict did not end there, nor did it remain a small trifle. What began as a little misunderstanding in communication, quickly grew into a schism of major differences and fault finding, ultimately the two exploded in an exchange of bitter words, leaving only cold silence between the two. This was the first serious rift in their 40 years of farming sideby-side, sharing machinery and trading labor and goods as needed - with ease and good will.

On a crisp autumn morning, shortly after the conflict had reached a crescendo there was a knock on John's door. He opened it to find a man with a carpenter's toolbox.

"I'm looking for a few days' work," he said. "Perhaps you would have a few small jobs here and there, I could help you with?"

The older brother needed to run some errands in town, so he helped the carpenter gather and prepare the necessary supplies and materials, and then he was off for the day.
