FROM THE EAST

This is an article about George Washington's diplomatic mission as a young 21-year-old British officer in 1753 to Fort Labouf in "Ohio River Valley." Many consider this mission to be the precursor to the French and Indian War. George



Washington and his travel companion, Christopher Gist, kept detailed journals. Dispatched from Virginia, George Washington's mission had three main objectives.

- 1) Deliver an official letter from Lt. Gov. Robert Dinwiddie, demanding the French cease building forts in The Ohio River Valley. British argued that, per the 18th century "Treaty of Utrecht," *they* had gained title to the Ohio River Valley from the Iroquois, who had conquered it in the 17th century. Note: The French did not agree, tracing their claim back to the voyages of Rene-Robert de LaSalle in the late 17th century.
- 2) Learn as much as he could about French fortifications and their intentions in the area.
- 3) Persuade as many Indian tribes in the region to trade with the British, *not* with the French.

Prior arriving at Fort Labouf, Washington and Gist met a Seneca Indian chief, Tanaghrisson, AKA the "Half King." Half King was one of four local Indian chiefs who accompanied George Washington on his trip to Fort Labouf. This mission was the start of a life-long relationship between George Washington and Half King, who frequently corresponded.

On his way to Fort Labouf, Washington stopped near the confluence of Allegheny, Monongahela, and Ohio rivers, in what is today downtown Pittsburgh. While stopped, Washington produced the first written

Think back to that day you became an Entered Apprentice. You had waited with patience – perhaps for months, perhaps not exactly so patient – for this big moment. You knew you had a long way to go in your journey, but you, the man they finally addressed as Brother, were now a Freemason. You stood before the Master of the Lodge among your Brothers, knowing you were a part of things... accepted... perhaps you even had a small sense of accomplishment.

Then, it all momentarily fell apart. You were asked for something you could not produce, and all of those warm, positive thoughts evaporated into a hopeless, empty feeling. You were the new guy. You wanted nothing more than to please your new Brothers. You saw an empty hand stretched out. You wanted to comply. You couldn't. Now what? Were they going to expel you for this? As your mind reeled, the Master explained what this was all about. You just received, in a graphic way, one of your first Masonic lessons.

Every Freemason, even if financially well-off, has for at least one fleeting moment known the despair of not having enough. That little object lesson, sometimes called the Rite of Destitution, certainly cannot compare to the reality of a life of grinding poverty, but the hope is it will teach you, the new Brother, that it is your duty – not your option, but your duty – to treat those in that condition fairly, to be able to empathize

with them and, if at all possible, contribute to the relief of any such person "so far as his necessities may require and your ability will permit."

Freemasonry being, as we are instructed, a progressive science, this is not the end of your lesson in charity. Elsewhere in our Masonic journey, we learn Relief is one of the great tenets of our craft. We in the United States and even the Western world are privileged in most cases to have the means to support ourselves and our families, but even here there are those who cannot do so. So we, as Freemasons, do what we can, both as Lodges and individuals.

It is a never-ending task. Jesus himself admonished us that, "the poor will always be with you." So undiscouraged, we remain aware that every little bit helps, and we never give up. Lodges, institutions, and persons of great means can – and do – make a significant difference with their contributions. The Shriners Hospitals, for example, have an immense impact on humanity with their charities and, with support, have the means to do it. We, as individuals and smaller Lodges, do not operate on the same level, but the spirit of our contributions is no less significant.

Most of our Brothers are individuals who would be generous to those less fortunate anyway, but it does not hurt to have that Rite of Destitution gnaw at us as a reminder that practicing the great tenet of Relief is the duty of every Freemason.

description of the land that is now Downtown Pittsburgh. "I spent some time in viewing the rivers and the land in the fork, which I think extremely well suited for a fort," he wrote when he reached the pointon Nov. 22, 1753. The French built Fort Duquesne at that same point in 1754.

Washington's reception at Fort Labouf was less than welcoming. Jacques Legardeur de Saint-Pierre, military commander at Fort Labouf, rejected Lt. Gov. Robert Dinwiddie's demand, and gave Washington a letter to deliver back to Dinwiddie. The letter ordered the Governor of Virginia to deliver his demand to the Major General of New France in the capital, Quebec City. Although the French gave Washington and his travel companions accommodations, they attempt to three-days' separate Washington and Gist from the four Indian chiefs. Inclement weather further delayed Washington's return trip.

Remembering his 2nd responsibility of the mission, Washington noted the fort had "one hundred men, a large number of officers, 50 birch canoes and 70 pine canoes, many unfinished." He described the fort as "on a south or west fork of French Creek, near the water, and almost surrounded by it. Four houses composed the sides. The bastions were made of piles driven into the ground, standing more than 12 feet (3.7 m.) high, and sharpened at the top. Portholes for cannon and loop-holes for small-arms were cut into the bastions. Each bastion mounted eight six-pound cannons and one four-pound cannon guarded the gate. Inside the bastions stood a guard-house, chapel, doctor's lodging and the commander's private stores. Outside the fort were several log barracks, some covered with bark, others with boards. In addition, there were stables, a smithy, and other buildings."

Washington, Gist, the Half King, and others began their return trip south in canoes, down the ice-clogged French Creek. Four days later, Washington and Gist determined they were heading in the wrong direction and decided to double back. The next day Washington and Gist came upon what they call "Murdering Town." From the South

As we embark on this month of March, I find myself reflecting on the season, its place in time and its associated symbols -budding blossoms of new growth in our gardens, birds returning to our greening trees, the wild March hare gallivanting through the desert



creosote, color and beauty returning to a, desolate landscape. All of which heralds to us the official birth of our Spring season, according to the path of the Sun.

Once upon a time, this Month was the threshold of the New Year. As the Sun enters the sign of the Ram, all Nature rejoices and Life itself seems to pay homage to birth and the emergence from darkness. This month, between the 20th & 21st we will (in the northern hemisphere) experience our Vernal (or Spring) Equinox. This word 'Equinox' translates to 'equal night' indicating that we have reached a fleeting balance between the Dark of night and the Light of day, in our annual trek around our central star.

On that day of Equinox, we find ourselves midway between Winter and Summer Solstice – swinging from the extreme of night, to the countering extreme of day. We will, for just a moment stand at that midpoint between those two proverbial pillars, yet continuing to swing towards the limit of the Suns dominance over darkness as the days grow longer, until the scalding effects of His rays demand a new retreat. I consider this place of the middle point of balance between these extremes, and I cannot help but to feel stark reminders of this Station of Junior Warden. Beauty. We, living here in Arizona certainly can attest to Nature's Beauty when in proportion and the harsh contrast she gives us when ill-proportioned. This is especially true at these equinoctial times of year; these are likely the most pleasant and "beautiful" times of the year, in Arizona. I often remark that I live in here specifically for the Spring and Autumn.

Further, on this matter of Beauty and balance numerous studies have been performed in various schools of Psychology which indisputably confirm that the human perception of Beauty is expressly prescribed through the recognition of equality and symmetry of proportion - Balance. The goddess Aphrodite (or Venus if you prefer) is

known for her portfolio of Love and Beauty. What is often forgotten is that she is tasked with Justice also. Even the very meaning of the word Justice derives from the latin iustitia, meaning: equity or vindication of *right*. We use the term a "Just and Upright" Mason. A beam is deemed to be plumb or upright when it is confirmed that it creates an exact *right* angle from the level ground,

when verified from all its sides - again attesting to symmetry and equality, justice and balance.

Like Nature herself, our lives, (and the work of Beauty that they ought to be), are most glorious when an equitable balance is reached. When we embrace our virtues - Temperance, Fortitude, Prudence and Justice, and employ Wisdom and Strength to *all* the many facets of life, the Great Work of our lives cannot help but to be Beautified.

With the recent celebration for W.B. Doc. Smith and the homage paid to our widows last month, a number of us were reminded that stoicism and grief alike, have their place in the grand scheme. Similarly, preparation does us no good unless the designs are executed - initiation of efforts is of little value if a plan is not first constructed. Rigor and celebration, labor and rest, discipline and reward - much like a diamond, there are ever so many facets in our lives that seem to ceaselessly require adjustment and truing as we continue to apply the Virtues creating beautiful lives as better men.

I look around our great body of Brothers that we call Scottsdale Lodge, and I am so grateful for all the Beauty I see! Much like the scene I expressed above, of life returning to a barren wilderness, after the winter - there is a sense of vibrance and life returning to our Fraternal efforts and exchange after a difficult state of affairs in the world. I frequently see my brothers recognizing and even celebrating the labors and works that are clearly evident in one another. There is a distinctly joyful buzz, that can be sensed, even when all are hard at work. Let's keep this up, my Brothers! This is so very Beautiful to see and even more thrilling to be part of, once again!


