Temperance, Fortitude, Prudence, and Justice. Keeping a Tongue of Good Report. Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth.



These and other virtues of Masonry are the cement of our society.

Temperance, not only in the sense of the avoidance of chemical excess through alcohol or drug abuse, but temperance in all respects. We should be careful and mindful not only of the things we put into our bodies, but more importantly, our minds. But we should also be careful of the things we put into the world.

We should be courageous enough, meaning to have the fortitude, to do the right thing for the Craft, for each other, and for the needy, even when doing nothing might seem the easiest path. Being a good Mason, and a Good Man, doesn't mean doing things that are easy – but doing the thing that is right. The cost might be high, but Right will win out in the end.

We should exercise Prudence, or Practical Wisdom, constantly. Some would say practical wisdom is simply common sense, but wise things are seldom common. Keeping a tongue of good report means that you will not bad mouth, or smirch the name of a brother Mason, but will instead talk to him privately when a difference arises, and if necessary, correct his errors face-to-face. Masons don't spread slanders about their brethren.

We practice charity to one another by exercising Brotherly Love. By the exercise of this tenet we grant that our brothers may be of a different mind about something than we are, and yet we still exercise our hearts to find a way to love them, to be charitable to them, no matter our differences. We can be of any country, sect, or opinion, and still be brothers under one Creator.

When our brothers are in need, no matter what, we have a duty to relieve them. This doesn't simply mean that we help them when they can't afford a tank of gas, or when they need assistance at the end of the year with dues because of some financial hardship. Charity with dollars is only one form of relief, and it is by far the least impactful. The best thing you can do for a brother in need is give something of yourself, so the next time someone needs your help, dig into the situation, and see what you can do to be of help.

Finally, and most of all, Masons deal with one another, and the broader world, honestly and truthfully. To be a just and upright Mason of any degree means that you have already begun to act upon the Square. To act upon the Square is to be honest. To tell the truth. To deal with your brother openly and honestly. If we are honest, we can never be caught in a lie. If we are honest, we can never be found to be insincere. If we are honest, we can never compromise ourselves or our principles as Masons.

AGE



With many Brothers being Veterans, this educational information on a VA Benefit from one of our Brothers can be of help.

VA Aid and Attendance: One of the least known benefits that could positively affect the lives of millions of Americans.

The Aid and Attendance benefit has been in existence for more than 60 years through the Department of Veteran Affairs. Aid and Attendance is a monthly payment to qualifying veterans or their surviving spouses to defray the cost of long-term care for those who need assistance with the daily activities of living such as dressing, bathing, toileting, eating and transferring. It is important to note is that this is a non-service-connected benefit, meaning it does not require the veteran to have been injured or disabled during his or her military service.

For 2023, an unmarried veteran can receive a maximum allowable benefit of \$2,229 each month. An un-remarried surviving spouse's maximum is \$1,432. A veteran and spouse can receive a maximum of \$2,642 a month. We say "maximum" because there are income qualifications that could lower the benefit amount. The good news: A&A is adjusted annually for cost of living increases.

Determining Eligibility

The first step is checking eligibility. First, the veteran must meet requirements for age (65 or older) and service (minimum 90 consecutive days of active duty with at least one day during a recognized period of wartime, with a better-than-dishonorable discharge status). In the case of a surviving spouse, the claimant must have been married to the veteran at the time of death and has not remarried.

Eligible periods of war: World War II: Dec. 7, 1941 – Dec. 31, 1946; Korean conflict: June 27, 1950 – Jan. 31, 1955; Vietnam era: Feb. 28, 1961 – May 7, 1975, for Veterans who served in the Republic of Vietnam during that period. Aug. 5, 1964 – May 7, 1975, for Veterans who served outside the Republic of Vietnam; Persian Gulf War: Aug. 2, 1990, through date to be prescribed by Presidential proclamation or law.

Next, the veteran, or the surviving spouse, must complete a medical assessment to show he or she needs assistance with at least two of the activities of daily living (ADLs). These ADLs are defined as bathing/showering, toileting, dressing, eating, and walking/transferring. The VA also recognizes that a person may function in those areas, but because of dementia or Alzheimer's there is a need for a protective living environment. The medical assessment

requires a form filled out by the claimant's regular physician, or forms from an ALF or in-home caregiver, depending on circumstances.

Income and Asset Tests

Then there are income and asset restrictions. The VA counts the gross income from sources such as, but not limited to, Social Security, pensions, required minimum distributions from IRAs, dividends and interest, annuities and rental income. However, the income is measured against unreimbursed medical expenses (UMEs), such as Medicare Part B premiums and supplemental healthcare premiums.

The asset test is more complicated. The limit for assets in 2023 is \$150,538, but the list of what counts as an asset and what does not gets tricky. For example, the home you live in and its tangible contents do not count. But you are moving into an ALF, so you sell the house. Sticking point: Now those proceeds from the house sale are considered an asset, and maybe that pushes you over the limit. The best way to assess your situation is to speak to a VA-accredited attorney.

Moving Forward

Applying for government benefits can be a daunting task, one that can seem difficult for even the most organized person when facing a blizzard of forms. Many people who attempt to navigate the application process on their own tend to give up after a year or more of problems and denials. In most instances, using an experienced attorney will increase the chances for approval and reduce the wait time.

An experienced attorney can use either Proactive Planning or At-Need Planning to assist you in obtaining this tremendous benefit. In 2018, the Department of Veterans Affairs instituted a three-year "look-back" period at transfers involving trusts, annuities, gifts, and jointly owned financial accounts. If an asset is transferred, the VA may count it as income or an asset.

That's why it is worthwhile to consult a VA-accredited attorney for proactive planning before you need care.

MASONIC EDUCATION

History of Arizona Masonry from the Grand Lodge of Arizona

John Goodwin, a Freemason, and his party arrived in the Arizona territory in December 1863. He established the territorial capital of Prescott, approximately twenty miles from Fort Whipple. In 1864 nine Master Masons held a meeting in Prescott at John N. Goodwin's house. Brother Goodwin presided at the meeting. After satisfying themselves that all present were Master Masons, those nine Masons decided to apply to the Grand Lodge of California for a dispensation to open a Lodge at Prescott. The name selected for the new lodge was Aztlan. Brother John T. Alsap, who later became the first mayor of Phoenix, was chosen as its first Master. Brother Goodwin was chosen to present the petition to the Grand Master of California. Brother Goodwin presented the petition on April 23rd, 1865, and the dispensation it requested was granted. In January 1867, after the California charter had been granted, Aztlan Lodge No. 177 was duly constituted and the officers installed by Past Master John Martin.

Freemasonry had officially arrived in Arizona. Thereafter, four more lodges were formed in succession. These four are Arizona Lodge in Phoenix (1879), Tucson Lodge in Tucson (1881), Solomon Lodge in Tombstone (1881), and White Mountain Lodge in Globe. All but White Mountain Lodge were chartered by the Grand Lodge of California. White Mountain Lodge was chartered by the Grand Lodge of New Mexico in 1881.

On the 23rd day of March, 1882, representatives from these four lodges convened in Tucson for the purpose of considering the propriety of establishing a Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons for the Territory of Arizona. A committee was formed to examine the credentials of the attending delegates, and after its satisfactory report, it was resolved that by vir-

tue of the powers vested in the members assembled it was right and proper that a Grand Lodge for the territory should be formed. A constitution was adopted and it was formally resolved, "That a lodge of Master Masons be opened for the purpose of organizing and opening, in Masonic form, the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons for the Territory of Arizona."

Officers were appointed to fill the stations and places and a Lodge of Master Masons was opened in ancient Masonic form. The various officers were elected as follows: Ansel Mellen Bragg, Grand Master; John Tabor Alsap, Deputy Grand Master; Alonzo Bailey, Senior Grand Warden; William Arthur Harwood, Junior Grand Warden; Abraham Marx, Grand Treasurer; and George James Roskruge, Grand Secretary.

On the 25th day of March, 1882, the grand officers were installed and the Master Masons Lodge was closed in the ancient Masonic form, the convention having accomplished the business for which it was called, adjourned sine die.

The Grand Lodge was then opened in proper form, with music by a choir and prayer by the Grand Chaplain, after which it examined and endorsed the charters held by the various lodges represented. Then it was decided that, "The Grand Lodge claimed as the boundaries of its jurisdiction the whole of the Territory of Arizona," and further, that the Grand Master be authorized to endorse the charter of Aztlan Lodge when called upon to do so. On March 25th, 1882, after installing the grand officers and accomplishing the business for which it was called, the Master Masons Lodge was closed in ancient Masonic form, sine die.

Aztlan lodge later became a chartered member, and together the five lodges forming the Grand Lodge had a total membership of 274 Masons.

Those five original lodges are still in existence today and are designated 'Territorial Lodges'.
