Question: What does Medical Respirators, William Sonoma, Sherlock Holmes. and Penicillin have all in common?



Answer: They were all invented by Masons.

This article is a short history lesson the famous Mason whose innovations have saved hundreds of thousands of lives.

Dr. Forrest Bird was a true American icon – an eccentric pilot, recipient of the Presidential Citizens Medal and the National Medal of Technology and Innovation, member of the Inventors Hall of Fame, and a Master Mason.

Dr. Forrest Bird was raised to the Sublime degree of Master Mason in 1957.

He flew virtually every airplane imaginable during WWII. On one mission flying a captured German aircraft from England to the United States he discovered the oxygen regulator created by the Germans required a substantial effort to breathe, and ultimately did not provide much value to the pilot. Intrigued, he knew that he could improve the breathing machine. Bird redesigned the regulator, tested it on himself, and presented his design to his superiors at the Air Corp.

It was a time not long after

Fort Sumter and The War of Northern Aggression was well under way. The Yankees, as they are still wont to do, had promptly flocked to Hilton Head and Tybee Islands, the barrier islands on opposite sides of the mouth of the Savannah River. The Savannah Folks didn't mind much that the Yankees had stolen the good beaches, for the water was still a bit cool for Southern preferences and, besides, they knew the gnats and mosquitoes would teach the Yankees a lesson they'd never forget. So, the Southerners, as Southerners are wont to do sometimes, just waited.

They didn't have to wait very long before the Yankees on Hilton Head sent out a messenger under a white flag. It seemed that the Yankees had among them a young fellow who had passed through the Fellow Craft Degree before shipping out. The Yanks were just sitting around slapping gnats when it occurred to one of them that, just maybe, there was a nearby lodge that could test him in the Fellow Craft Degree and raise him to that of a Master Mason.

As luck would have it, there was indeed a lodge in Savannah that would soon be having a Masters Degree.

One morning, not too many days later, a detail of Confederate Cavalry slipped across the Savannah River into South Carolina and traveled through Bluffton to the shore opposite Hilton Head Island.

Dr. Bird was inducted into the National Inventors Hall of Fame in 1995 for developing the first low-cost, massproduced pediatric respirator, known as the Baby Bird.

During the Polio epidemic Dr. Bird invented the Mark 7, which was the first respirator used to wean patients off the Iron Lung successfully. His invention marked the birth of modern respiratory pressure ventilation as we know it today.

Dr. Bird's respirators were so well-known that even Fidel Castro requested Bird respirators from the U.S. Government as part of an arrangement to release prisoners captured during the Bay of Pigs.

From there they escorted one Fellow

Craft Mason and, I believe, a number of Master Masons of the Northern Persuasion, safely through the Confederate Lines and back through about 35 miles of Confederate defenses to Savannah where the candidate and his witnesses were delivered into the lodge.

The records note that this Brother was indeed proficient in the Fellow Craft Degree and he was raised to the Degree of a Master Mason.

That night another detail of Confederate Cavalry, no doubt Brothers to a man, slipped back across the Savannah River and safely escorted their Brothers back to Hilton Head.

As I have spent time visiting with many of you this past month, I have listened to concerns and joys, have shared condolences, counsel, and love. It seems as though many of us are going





Wisdom of the Owl

"Owls are patient messengers, bringers of information and the holders of wisdom, and capable of seeing the unseen.

For as long as humankind has recognized animals as teachers, wise people have recognized traits worthy or respect in both wild and domestic creatures. The cultural and spiritual significance of certain animals transcends geographical boundaries. But the majestic and mysterious owl has, for over many millennia, served as the focal point of numerous contradictory beliefs. Though owls have been regarded with awe and fascination, they have also served as agents of fear. Since owls are nocturnal, human-owl encounters tended to occur at night and likely when the bird was swooping silently down to earth to grapple with prey. Yet even as some shied away from the owl, calling it an agent of darkness, others recognized the depths of awareness in beautiful owls' eyes.

In the Classical Greek tradition, an owl could often be found perched on the shoulder of Athena, goddess of wisdom, while owls could ward off bad luck in Roman lore. It is in Indigenous American mythos that the own attains its own unique identity. Owls are patient messengers, bringers of information, and the holders of wisdom, and they are capable of seeing the unseen. With their keen eyesight, they can glance into the soul to discern meaning and motive and they are totems of truth. Unlike our distant forebears, we may never




We have found the difference between management and leadership. Management is doing things right; leadership is doing the right things.






Arizona Grand Lodge Website
